## **CRIMINAL COURTROOM ROLES**

**CARD SORT** 

The judge	Presides over the court and enforces the rules of the court to ensure that all parties in a matter are treated fairly and equally.	Responsible for making decisions about the law and deciding the sentence of a guilty person.
The prosecutor	Represents the community of the ACT and is also known as the Crown.	Must prove the defendant in a criminal matter is guilty beyond a reasonable doubt.
The defence lawyer	Represents the defendant in a criminal case.	Must show that there is a reasonable doubt in the case and that the defendant is not guilty of the crime.
The defendant	The person charged with a crime and on trial.	Has a right to remain silent and is presumed to be innocent until proven guilty.
A witness	Someone who saw or heard something that is relevant to the case.	Must promise to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth when speaking in court.
The jury	A group of 12 people from the community who are randomly selected to hear a criminal case and deliver a verdict.	Must make a unanimous decision (everyone must agree) about whether the defendant is guilty or not guilty of the crime.
The complainant	The victim of the crime and usually the person who reports the crime to the police.	Is usually asked to be a witness and give evidence in the case.

The judge	The person charged with a crime and on trial.	Must prove the defendant in a criminal matter is guilty beyond a reasonable doubt.

The complainant	The victim of the crime and usually the person who reports the crime to the police.	Someone who saw or heard something that is relevant to the case.
